HAPPY NEW YEAR!

That sounds odd, doesn't it, but it is true. This year, the last day of November marked the beginning of the Church year and the start of Advent. So happy New Year and happy Advent.



As our culture has quickened its pace, in its rush towards Christmas, the Church has stood bulwark against it, using the season of Advent to cast a different vision of preparation for the birth of Jesus. The church has said slow down, find quiet, draw near to God's presence, and listen for His quiet calling to you. It's a good message, greatly needed to soothe our souls during the onslaught of commercialism.

I invite you to seek ways to slow down this Advent. Take a few minutes each day to find quiet. Consider what the Incarnation, the birth of Jesus, means to you. Find your soul's voice.

Your soul wants to have its say. The soul speaks in remarkable ways. First, the soul holds and cares for our life's purposes. Each one of us, each soul, has a unique set of purposes in the world. Every soul resonates with the world differently. When we are out of step with our soul and our purposes—be it at work or home—we find no peace. When our actions resonate with our soul, we discover peace. Equally, the soul is the seat of grief. When we grieve the loss of another or a dashed dream the pain emerges from our souls. Moreover, the soul holds the elixir of joy. When our actions resonate with our souls, we feel joy, which is far greater than feeling happy. There are other qualities and expressions of the soul, but these are particularly relevant this time of year.

At the beginning of this "New Year", this Advent, I invite you to give space for your soul to speak. Take time to ask yourself the following questions: Are my choices in line with my soul and life's purposes? *(continued on pg.2)*

Items for teenagers— watches and gift cards are very popular

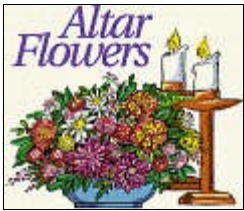


Please leave unwrapped gifts in the Parish hall. **Last date** to give a gift is **Sunday December 7th**. Thank you for participating in our Outreach Program.

This year we are trying something new in our preparation for Christmas. The vestry agreed that we would have altar flowers for the four Sundays in Advent, to brighten our spirits as we approach Christmas. It also means we have four additional Sundays for people to honor or remember someone by signing up on the chart to provide flowers for the altar.

The following is a review of the process for signing up for flowers: There is a chart in the vestibule of the church with dates for the various Sundays. There is space for you to write your name and the name of the person/persons you want remembered. Anyone may do this for any free Sunday. The cost is \$32.00. If you would like to pair up with someone we could honor two sets of people. Then the cost would be \$16.00 each. Of course you would have to find someone who would agree to this arrangement.

On any Sunday that you have donated the altar flowers you may take the arrangements home with you. They are yours— you bought them! If you do not wish to take the flowers, or only one of the pair, tell someone, as the flowers might be able to go to a sick or housebound person.

Any suggestions for improvement to the system are welcome.
